

Ahhh! Summer. A time to relax and enjoy those lazy days filled with trips to the park, family vacations and backyard barbecues, right?

Not so fast! Summer can entail more than just a change from the usual routine. For children, it can mean a serious loss of learning. Research shows that many children experience a 'summer slump' and can lose about four weeks of growth from the previous school year. However, there are many things a parent can do to keep their child's brain active. Here are a few ideas recommended by experts to help prevent the dreaded 'brain drain.'

Read between the lines. Have your child join the local library's summer reading program or start their own reading program or book club. They can set a goal for reading so many books and even keep track on a book 'growth' chart.

Incorporate reading into everyday activities by pointing out bill-boards, fliers, food containers and such. Younger children can play the alphabet game on longer drives.

Talk the talk. Ask questions about anything and everything, but not the kind of questions that only illicit "yes" or "no" answers. For instance, ask "What did you like about...?" Get children talking, and you may be able to turn a normal experience into a teaching moment.

Got Game? Organize game nights not just for your family, but in the neighborhood. Play educational games like Scrabble, Uno crossword puzzles, Sudoku or basic card games. They make for a fun night and reinforce skills such as memory, concentration, logic and reasoning. They also teach children how to take turns, and be both a good winner and a good loser.

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Vacation your body, not your mind. Going on a trip can be a great time to expand more than your physical horizons. Use the library and internet to learn about the destination and its historical sites. Study maps and plot mileage.

It all adds up to fun. According to the National Summer Learning Association, losing math skills is the biggest threat. Try a number of activities to reinforce math skills. For instance, look at the measurements in a recipe you're making and ask your child to double it. Ask your child to compute the 15% tip on the restaurant bill, or determine how many gallons of gas are needed to travel the 50 miles to grandma's house. Make math a part of your everyday life.

New medications form required for 2014-15 school year

The Board of Education recently adopted a **new medications form** that will be required annually **beginning in the 2014-15 school year** to administer any medication, including over the counter medications provided by parents or guardians.


We are notifying you of this change now so that as you make appointments for sports physicals or immunizations, you can take this with you to obtain the required physician signature. For this guideline, "physician" refers to any health care provider licensed by the State of Michigan. This form was developed to support our revised Board Policy 5330, which meets new provisions of the State of Michigan Model Policy for Administering Medications to Pupils at Schools. "Medication" includes prescription, non-prescription and herbal medications, and include those taken by mouth, inhaler, injection, and drops or applied to the skin. Medication must be kept in a locked school location, and in a labeled container as prepared by a pharmacy, physician, or pharmaceutical company with the pupil's name, the name of the medication, the dosage, and the frequency of administration. The annual written permission form MUST be signed by both the parent and physician. This new form is now available on the district website www.gpschools.org and will be part of the online registration process. Please download it today and take to your next appointment.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT 2013 - 2014: The Year in Review

The Defer staff put School Improvement on center stage, and I am proud of all we accomplished.

A few highlights:



- **5 In / 5 Out** As a part of our School Improvement our staff focused on Writing. Our goal was to break down each grade level and establish the skills that each and every students must leave the grade owning. These are the survival skills when it comes to writing. Our 5 In/5 Out posters are ready for all classrooms in each grade as we continue this work next year.
- **Problem Based Learning** PBL integrates knowing and doing. Students learn knowledge and elements of the core curriculum, but also apply what they know to solve authentic problems and produce results that matter. PBL students take advantage of digital tools to produce high quality, collaborative products. PBL refocuses education on the student, not the curriculum--a shift mandated by the global world, which rewards intangible assets such as drive, passion, creativity, empathy, and resiliency.
- **Genius Hour** Along the same line as PBL, Genius Hour provides for students learning around a real-world question they have. That question might be how does lightning work, or what animals are part of the cat world and how do they differ from each other. The use of technology is employed to show learning this learning in a variety of ways.
- Common Core Writing/Reading Units of Study All grades implemented new curriculum in both reading and writing this year. Units of Study are grade specific and emphasize both fiction and informational reading and writing and are aligned to Common Core.
- **Rtl** Response to Intervention occurred at all grade levels this year. Using testing data students were grouped by need for focused instruction three times a week, while other students received enrichment instruction during this time.
- School-wide Interventions for Grades 3 through 5 Lunch and Learn, Lunch Fact Practice, Boys' Writing Club, 3rd girls' Writing Club, and Homework Club were some of the ways that additional support were provided for struggling learners in addition to Title 1.

Dear Parents.

Kindergarten through third grade students (and 4th and 5th grade students in Reading Club) will be able to access Reading Raz and Raz Rocket all summer long. This is a wonderful opportunity to prevent "Summer Slide" where a student's reading level slides backwards over the summer months.

Passwords and other sign in information were sent home earlier in the year. If your child does not know this information, please contact your child's teacher to find it out before this school year ends.

Try accessing the Reading Raz website by going to www.raz-kids.com from your Internet browser and click on "Log In."

- Then type in your teacher's username and click "Go." Next, find your child's name or symbol on the chart and click on that symbol. Lastly, enter a picture password if prompted (some classes don't use the picture password).
- Your child has already been assigned a reading level and will earn points for reading stories, taking quizzes, or completing a level.
- All students attaining the Fleet Admiral status by the end of the summer will be invited to a Raz Rocket party in September and be given a special treat!

Dear Students and Parents,

This summer our elementary schools will be moving to an online registration process, as the middle and high schools did previously. In order to attend School Registration, a pre-registration receipt for each student must be signed by a parent/guardian, printed, and presented. Schedules will not be released without this document. This will reduce our paper use and postage and processing costs, which in turn helps keep funding focused on the classroom.

- The link to on-line pre-registration will be on the school and district website www.gpschools.org.
- A parent/guardian e-mail address is required to complete the on-line process. If you do not have a valid e-mail address, you can easily establish a free e-mail account on search engines such as www.gmail.com or www.gahoo.com.
- If your e-mail address has changed, update it with the school district by e-mailing: ParentConnect@gpschools.org. Include in the e-mail your name, child's name, school name, and your old and new e-mail address. Requests for forgotten login passwords will be sent only to the e-mail address registered with the school district. Only one primary email address will be sent the "access key" for pre-registration.
- Your Parent Connect password (access key) and student's ID number (log in ID) will be necessary to pre-register your student on-line. If you have misplaced or forgotten this information, please send an e-mail to ParentConnect@gpschools.org TODAY.
- If you do not have internet access at home, you may access computers at local public libraries.
- If you have changed your home address, it is mandatory to contact the Enrollment Office as soon as possible, but at least one week before registration at 313-432-3083 to update your home address. You can walk in to the office at 389 St. Clair, from 8-4, Monday through Friday.
- In order to attend school registration, a pre-registration completed form signed by a parent/ guardian for each student must be printed and presented.
- All registration forms must be filled out on-line to complete the process. Instructions will be on the pre-registration site. These include photo release, FERPA and the new medication form.
- All fees and fines will need to be paid on-line with a credit or debit card. Cash or checks will not be accepted at school registration. (Visa or MasterCard debit cards may be purchased from a variety of retail stores.)
- You must bring the final on-line checkout pre-registration form signed by a parent/guardian to registration. Schedules will not be released without this form at registration.

Plan on 2014-15 being a great year in the Grosse Pointe Public School System. The staff is eagerly awaiting an exciting and challenging year with our children. The first day of elementary school is Tuesday, September 2, 2014, and is a half day. School begins at 8:25 a.m. and dismissal is at 3:38 p.m.
