

Parent/ Teacher /Student Conferences A 'Tip Sheet' for Parents

As a parent, you are your child's first and most important teacher. You and Defer School have something in common: We both want your child to learn and do well. When parents and teachers talk to each other, each person can share important information about your child's talents and needs. Each person can also learn something new about how to help your child. Parent-teacher conferences are a great way to start talking to your child's teacher. This tip sheet suggests ways that you can make the most of the parentteacher conferences so that everyone wins, especially your child.

What should you expect?

• A two-way conversation. Like all good conversations, parent/ teacher/student conferences are best when both people talk and listen. The conference is a time for you to learn about your child's progress in school: share your child's data notebook and see information about grades, test scores, and homework completion. Find out whether your child is meeting school expectations and academic standards. This is also a time for the teacher to learn about what your child is like at home. When you share with the teacher about your child's skills, interests, needs, and dreams, the teacher can help your child more.

PARENT TEACHER CONFERENCES 11/12 & 11/13

This year the Defer conferences are scheduled on the evening of November 12th and all day November 13th. Most parents set up a scheduled conference time at Back to School Night. If you have not set up an appointment, please let your child's teacher know right away so that a time can be scheduled. The goal of the Defer staff is that we have 100% attendance at our Fall Conferences.

- Emphasis on Learning. Good parent/teacher/ student conferences focus on how well the child is doing in school. They also talk about how the child can do even better. To get ready for the conversation, look at your child's homework, tests, and their data notebook before the conference. Keep track of any questions you may have that you would like to ask the teacher.
- **Opportunities and challenges.** Just like you, teachers want your child to succeed. You will probably hear positive feedback about your child's progress and areas for improvement. Be prepared by thinking about your child's strengths and challenges beforehand. Be ready to ask questions about ways you and the teacher can help your child with some of his or her challenges.



Student Data/ Leadership Binders

Conferences are coming up next week and your student will be sharing their *Data Binder or Leadership Binders* with you before and during your student conference. **So what's a Data Binder?**

This year at Defer School all students are tracking their learning in their personal data binder. They are graphing their own progress in a variety of areas at each grade level. Some examples would include: weekly spelling tests, NWEA scores, PBIS behavior, homework completion, and sight word recognition. Based on these graphs students are reflecting on their work and on their progress. Spelling test scores might indicate to one student that their test preparation is working and to another student that they are not working hard enough to master their spelling words. We want our students to be proactive about their own learning and data binders are a tool to grow these skills.

In most grades students will be bringing their data binders home prior to the conferences to discuss the data they have collected so far. What is the data telling us? What goals should we be setting?

THE IMPORTANCE OF HOMEWORK

What does the term 'homework' mean to you? In your family, does 'homework' have a positive or a negative connotation? For some, the word 'homework' is associated with the idea that such work is drudgery, a necessary evil of attending school. For others, homework is viewed as a precious opportunity to boost learning, *and they're right*!!!!

There are three purposes for assigning of homework. They are listed below along with an example of this type of homework being assigned at Defer.

- 1. To give students opportunities to practice skills. To execute a skill, students must reach a level of self-sufficiency. When practicing, they are to improve their accuracy and speed. At Defer math fact practice, spelling practice, and EDM homework all fall into this category.
- 2. To prepare students for a new topic. To do this students have to retrieve their prior knowledge. This homework might ask a child to reflect on what they have learned from other classes, or from their reading. For example, if the students were going to read Jack London's "To Build A Fire", the homework might be to write experiences they have had in bitter cold.
- **3. To elaborate on introduced material.** This type of homework asks the student to extend their knowledge. For example, our 5th graders studied controls and variables in Science and then set up an experiment to test their own hypothesis using controls and one variable.

Fast Facts and Tips for Homework

- In order for students to reach competency, **they must practice it 24 times**. When your child does not do their homework they have missed out on a practice session towards mastery.
- Students should keep track of their assignments by using an agenda or homework notebook. *Our students complete their agendas every day at Defer.*
- If students are practicing a skill like times tables they would benefit from keeping track of their speed and accuracy. *Students track this information in their data binders at school.*
- All students should read for at least 20 minutes a night. This is in addition to their assigned homework.
- Parents should help with homework by establishing a routine and finding a place.
- The amount of homework should be enough to equal grade level times 10. In other words, 3rd graders should have 30 minutes of homework on school nights, and 4th graders should have 40 minutes.

Bottom Line

Homework is essential to student learning! Did you do your homework tonight?

Dear Families:

The Grosse Pointe Public School System will begin the process of identifying students for academic learning opportunities where they are most appropriately challenged for the fall of 2015.

These learning opportunities include:

- Differentiation in a general education classroom.
- Cluster grouping in math, language arts, or both.
- Our Magnet program, which focuses on the specific needs of academically gifted children.
 - Magnet classrooms are a 2/3 split and a 4/5 split and are housed at Defer Elementary and Ferry Elementary.

Students in grades first through fourth may be nominated by parents and/or their teachers. All nominations will be reviewed by our Child Study Committee consisting of teachers and administrators. This committee will review all nomination information as well as student testing data. As a committee we will provide recommendations to both families and to the nominated student's elementary school.

If your child's academic needs are currently being met, there is no need to nominate your child. If you would like your child considered for cluster grouping, or the magnet program, please complete the nomination form.

All nomination forms will be submitted directly to the Administration Building, 389 St. Clair, second floor c/o Patty Divirgil or Sue Vogel before Friday, December 12th for more information 313.432.3033 or 313.432.3043.

The Child Study recommendations will be finalized by May 2015. Each nominated family will receive a letter of recommendation from the committee.

Differentiation Instructional Philosophy

Differentiated instruction is the philosophy of the Grosse Pointe School District. This means children have the right to learn material at a rate, format, and depth that maximizes their learning. Differentiation is just one of many teaching practices used in our district. It can be subtle or very visible – that often depends on the needs of the individual learners and the goals for the group. All students experience some degree of differentiation in their classroom. It is not an accelerated program or a remediation of material – it is a constantly changing blend of the two based on the professionalism of the educator and the individual needs of the student.

The Grosse Pointe Public School District believes that providing differentiated learning opportunities to all students is a critical component of our educational system. It is a teaching strategy and one tool that all of our teaching professionals use daily with students to guarantee their personal and academic growth. It is challenging and informal; it is flexible and makes learning fun.

How will I know when Differentiated Instruction is happening in my child's classroom?

Differentiation provides all students formal and informal opportunities to stretch and learn. This philosophy stresses teachers focus on individuals - we guide their individual learning and celebrate their individual success. Βv focusing on student strengths, we bring forth their best. Differentiated learning opportunities may be clear when the child discusses how they worked in a small group on a different learning task while other students in the classroom worked on their different learning task. Differentiation learning opportunities may be less obvious through a teacher's questioning technique, or by having different expectations for a student's writing progress. Differentiation could also occur in math instruction through learning opportunities to explore a topic further or the need for additional support and practice. Our teachers make thoughtful and meaningful decisions for all of their students using differentiated instruction throughout their teaching day.

If you have further questions regarding differentiated instruction, please consult your child's teacher.

Cluster Grouping in Math, Language Arts or Both

Cluster grouping is a formalized process for guaranteeing differentiation for our most capable learners. The Grosse Pointe Schools offer formal cluster grouping for grades 2-5 in Math and Language Arts. Cluster grouping will look different in each teacher's classroom. Typically a clustered student is ready to move at a more rapid pace once they have the base knowledge of the concept(s) being taught. Teachers may use different instructional strategies to meet the needs of these students within their homeroom. Clustering could be a small group of learners who already have mastered a concept accepting a more challenging problem to solve collectively, with a learning partner, or alone. Cluster grouping is not increasing the guantity of the work produced or changing the grade level of the curriculum being explored. It impacts the complexity of their grade level assignments and their curriculum. Cluster groupings yield deeper, richer experiences that challenge all students at their individual learning level.

Is Cluster Grouping always formal?

No, Cluster Grouping can occur as the product of formal and informal identification. A student may be nominated by parents, teachers and/or the Child Study Committee and that process will be influenced by a combination of observation, work product and formal /informal assessment. Cluster groups may be based on ability, interest, learning styles, etc. Our teaching professionals are adept at identifying the individual needs of our learners and will cluster them appropriately so that each and every child shows growth.




WALK TO SCHOOL WEEK SUCCESS
