Introduction

The Poupard Elementary School community is committed to providing a learning environment that encompasses the social, emotional, intellectual and physical development of all students.

Our staff continues to grow professionally to meet the increasing needs of students. We continue to provide a safe and exciting learning environment for your child to enjoy.

Our goals for school improvement include reading, writing and social skill development. Our staff continues to create the most positive learning atmosphere that insures all students will learn. Understanding the importance of reading, teachers see all students in the school in small guided reading groups consisting of three – ten students for forty five uninterrupted minutes a day. We also use writing strategies such as 6 + 1 and writer's workshop to not only create better writers but also have the students find writing enjoyable.

Understanding the importance of character education, we continue to expand our lifelong character guidelines and life skills committed to creating school-wide interventions to help students reach their potential. Our staff and students continue with Positive Behavior Support (PBS), which encourages students to take ownership of their own actions and take responsibility for their own behavior. Our staff operates on the premise that each student is expected to be respectful, responsible and ready to learn. We promote this belief by offering students positive behavior incentives such as blue ribbon tickets that can be used at our school store, cookies and milk with the principal, walking to Wendy's for lunch and good citizenship breakfasts. These are just a few of our incentives. We observe good peer relationships, being considerate of others, and improved self esteem. We have set high behavioral expectations for our students. As a result, their expectations for themselves have increased and we have more school spirit. Poupard is proud of our students.

The Poupard PTO and volunteers deserve our most sincere thanks for making our school activities so successful. Without the support of parents, the success of our school culture and student learning would be much harder to attain. All of our fund raising activities are family events. We believe in building a rich family culture. We

Core Curriculum

The Grosse Pointe Public School System's core curriculum is developed under the auspices of the Educational Programs Leadership Council (EPLC), a group of teachers, parents, students, and administrators who meet monthly.

The core curriculum is based upon state standards in all subjects and extends beyond those standards by incorporating exemplary national standards. Curriculum committees, comprised of teachers, parents, students and administrators develop plans for each curriculum area. In addition, the views of the broader community are sought through Public Forums. The reports of the curriculum committees, which are submitted first to the EPLC and then to the Board of Education, include recommendations regarding assessment, staff development, integration of technology, and differentiated instruction to accommodate academic diversity as well as the curriculum itself. The district also offers a wide array of advanced placement and challenging enrichment courses and a comprehensive special education program.

During 2007–08 the district implemented a new Mathematics curriculum and piloted a variety of math materials culminating in the selection of *Everyday Math* for grades 1-5 and Harcourt for Kindergarten. A new social studies curriculum was adopted for grades K-2 and 5 (grades 3 and 4 are still under study due to late changes in the state curriculum) and materials to support instruction were purchased.

During 2008-09 the science curriculum will be under review. Kindergarten and first grade teachers and reading specialists also received significant training and support materials to implement FAST reading strategies in 2008-09. Additional model units and technology applications are continually being integrated into curricular areas.

The district's strong curriculum is demonstrated by the continuing high performance of our students on standardized assessments including NWEA, MEAP, ACT, SAT, and Advanced Placement tests.
