Introduction

Each year we publish and present an annual report to our community, providing a snapshot of the student achievement in our district. Like many annual reports, the document can appear complicated as it relays figures and statistics from a variety of sources. For a school district that serves just over 8000 students in nine elementaries, three middle schools, two high schools, and our Early Childhood Center at Barnes, the sheer volume of information can be a bit overwhelming unless you study those figures every day. We do.

We don't just administer tests and report results, we analyze the scores for the district, for each school, for individual classes and for each student. We use that data to update curriculum, to diversify instructional methods, and to measure progress so

we can best meet the needs of each and every student, each and every day. Annually we develop school improvement goals for each school and the district, using that data-driven approach to continuous improvement.

Our community has a strong commitment to student achievement and academics which results in rigorous and comprehensive curriculum options throughout our elementary, middle school and high school programs. The curriculum provides an extensive foundation in the basics as well as enrichment programs, summer learning options, advanced placement opportunities, instructional technology, foreign language and independent study. Guidance and counseling services, special education and other learning services support success for our students needing additional assistance. Grosse Pointe Schools offer a wide array of interscholastic and intramural sports, clubs and extra-curricular activities, and fine and performing arts programs.

With approved bond and sinking fund elections, we have made substantial renovations and improvements to each of our buildings, fine and performing arts venues, athletic fields, and pools. State Lighthouse grant and Grosse Pointe Foundation for Public Education (GPFE) monies for technology have allowed us to integrate an array of electronic tools into the teaching and learning as well as the business side of our organization.

Core Curriculum

The Grosse Pointe Public School System's core curriculum is developed under the auspices of the Educational Programs Leadership Council (EPLC), a group of teachers, parents, students, and administrators who meet monthly.

The core curriculum is based upon state standards in all subjects and extends beyond those standards by incorporating exemplary national standards. Curriculum committees, comprised of teachers, parents, students and administrators develop plans for each curriculum area. In addition, the views of the broader community are sought through Public Forums. The reports of the curriculum committees, which are submitted first to the EPLC and then to the Board of Education, include recommendations regarding assessment, staff development, integration of technology, and differentiated instruction to accommodate academic diversity as well as the curriculum itself. The district also offers a wide array of advanced placement and challenging enrichment courses and a comprehensive special education program.

During 2009-10 the district began implementation of the new social studies curriculum for grades K-3, and 5-6. Grades 3 and 4 will be rolled out in 2010-11. English/language arts curriculum was the core curriculum under review, roll out is planned for the fall of 2010. Computer education curriculum continues to be under review, these curriculum changes will reflect the district's investment in new curriculum for teachers grades Kindergarten through twelve.

The district's strong curriculum is demonstrated by the continuing high performance of our students on standardized assessments including NWEA, MEAP, ACT, SAT, and Advanced Placement tests.

School Improvement Plan—District Level

Grosse Pointe Public School System has had a district Strategic Planning process in place since 1987. The goals of the most recent Strategic Plan, as approved by the Board of Education include:

- Goal 1: As a result of challenging educational programs, high student achievement and outstanding opportunities available for all its students, the Grosse Pointe Public School System is considered the state's premier school district.
- Goal 2: A highly competent staff, committed to the highest standard of excellence, creates a positive learning environment for all students.
- Goal 3: Technology is effectively integrated to support the work of students and staff so that learning results improve and productivity is enhanced.
- Goal 4: The district's communication initiatives keep residents well informed, enhance community partnerships and attract new families to the district.
- Goal 5: The district acts as a wise steward of its financial assets by following guiding
 principles to determine funding, controlling costs and maximizing the benefits received
 from its assets to support and enhance the instructional program and successfully
 cultivating new sources of revenue.
