### Introduction

During the 2009-10 school year, Père Gabriel Richard Elementary School served 401 students from Kindergarten to fifth grade. The staff included 18 classroom teachers and teachers of Art, Vocal and Instrumental Music, Physical Education, Spanish and Library/Media. Other professionals included a Language Arts/Reading Specialist, Resource Center Specialist,



Psychologist, Social Worker, Speech Pathologist, and an Autism Spectrum Disorder teacher.

Our beautiful eighty-year-old school building displays lovely architectural elements and has been maintained, updated and air-conditioned over the years. It has been declared by the State of Michigan to be a historical site, yet it has a full computer lab, wireless laptops available for students throughout the entire school building, and SMART Boards in every classroom.

Teachers use a variety of instructional strategies according to students' abilities, learning styles, and interests. These differentiation strategies include instructional pacing, acceleration, flexible grouping, in-depth studies, cooperative learning, and high-interest activities. An after-school Homework Club continued to provide assistance when needed for students at all grade levels.

Many enrichment opportunities were provided for students by teachers and Richard parent volunteers. These activities included Fourth and Fifth Grade Choir, Student Council, Service Club, Safety Patrol, Science club, Lego-building, scrap-booking, games and puzzles, knitting, yoga, quilting and many other activities scheduled outside the regular school day.

Our Richard PTO provided generous support for our students including assemblies, classroom materials, enrichment activities, and library books. This year, a Richard READS program was put into action by parents to encourage reading across all grade levels. Our SMART Boards were a joint purchase by our PTO and the district.

Richard School parents are very committed to their children's education and show it on a daily basis through volunteering in classrooms, the lunchroom, and the playground and by participating in enrichment activities, field trips, career aware-

ness, and assemblies.

As a result of the efforts of parents, staff, and students, our school was awarded a Michigan Evergreen School Certificate of Achievement for outstanding performance and lasting contribution to conservation and preservation of the environment.

Assignment of Students The Board has determined attendance areas and students shall be expected to attend school within that area. A parent may request a transfer or appeal a placement decision on behalf of their student.

The principal shall be responsible for assigning students to classes. In the elementary schools, the principal, in determining the grade level for any new student, may take into consideration the previous schooling of the student but may assign the student to a lower grade level or higher grade level, if in the principal's judgment such an assignment would be in the best interests of the student. In the middle school and in the senior high school students will be assigned to counselors, classes and instructors by the building principal.

The district also has in place policies and guidelines which guide promotion and retention.

#### **Core Curriculum**

The Grosse Pointe Public School System's core curriculum is developed under the auspices of the Educational Programs Leadership Council (EPLC), a group of teachers, parents, students, and administrators who meet monthly.

The core curriculum is based upon state standards in all subjects and extends beyond those standards by incorporating exemplary national standards. Curriculum committees, comprised of teachers, parents, students and administrators develop plans for each curriculum area. In addition, the views of the broader community are sought through Public Forums. The reports of the curriculum committees, which are submitted first to the EPLC and then to the Board of Education, include recommendations regarding assessment, staff development, integration of technology, and differentiated instruction to accommodate academic diversity as well as the curriculum itself. The district also offers a wide array of advanced placement and challenging enrichment courses and a comprehensive special education program.

During 2009-10 the district began implementation of the new social studies curriculum for grades K-3, and 5-6. Grades 3 and 4 will be rolled out in 2010-11. English/language arts curriculum was the core curriculum under review, roll out is planned for the fall of 2010. Computer education curriculum continues to be under review, these curriculum changes will reflect the district's investment in new curriculum for teachers grades Kindergarten through twelve.

The district's strong curriculum is demonstrated by the continuing high performance of our students on standardized assessments including NWEA, MEAP, ACT, SAT, and Advanced Placement tests.

### **School Improvement Plan**

<u>Writing</u>: Students will increase achievement in writing skills across all curriculum areas.

<u>Reading:</u> Students will increase reading comprehension across all curriculum areas.

<u>Mathematics</u>: Students will increase problem solving skills and basic computation skills according to the expectations at each grade level.

The Richard Elementary School Improvement Plan includes strategies and objectives that are aligned with the district curriculum and the State of Michigan Grade Level Content Expectations. The staff gathers and reviews data in order to plan future instructional goals. Staff development is an integral component of the ongoing school improvement process.
