I love the energy in all of our buildings as we opened our doors to students Wednesday, September 3, to begin a new school year. what they are learning in school and how these lessons are applied in the world outside the classroom. For example, over 80% of our teaching staff holds advanced degrees and summer is a popular time to take those Masters, Specialists and Ph.D. classes. Also, due to options such as Camp Invention and writing, drama and television production classes as well as the more traditional enrichment and credit options, over 900 students participated in summer school this year. Learning doesn't end for our staff or students.

Just as individual students are thinking about the contents of their backpacks, our administrative team is doublechecking the largest collection of textbook purchases in district history. Over \$1 million was spent on new textbooks this year after curricular teams carefully reviewed which options most closely match state and national standards and benchmarks, as well as our rigorous local standards. Some of these are for new courses like Robotics, Digital Seminar and Applied Medical Investigations that again demonstrate the unique community partnerships presented here. Technology is another area of exciting continued growth. The district's new 2008-2011 technology plan shows our concerted efforts to provide the best technological training and experiences for our students with appropriate staff development and knowledge of students' aptitude and expectations for this digital world.

All summer, administrative and support staff members have been enrolling students, with activities ranging from checking residency documentation, to providing professional development for new teachers, to counseling students on course selection.

Throughout the summer, many things have occurred which may not have been visible when driving past our buildings, and the last weeks of summer have a particularly hectic pace. Our facilities staff has worked to finish summer bond and sinking fund projects enabled by our community to ensure our beautiful buildings continue to provide a safe and secure environment that encourages learning.

Based on data accumulated through student performance in various tests and activities, the administration identifies academic areas that need improvement. In this issue you will find many testing results.

The Board receives the data along with the analysis of the data by the professional educators. The assessment continues with a plan of action. The Board then evaluates the plan to make sure it is congruent with the Board's philosophy and vision for the district.

Other pillars of district performance include our financial status as well as the positive learning environment. Budget parameters are set in collaboration with administration following review of student enrollment and the rate of per-pupil reimbursement. Goals for the district learning environment include the state and security of our buildings, and the positive behavioral supports we apply for all our students. Last spring a district survey was performed to obtain community input on the learning environment pillar of the district. This data is used to help formulate goals in that area.



Given this year's data analysis the superintendent has recommended goals in several areas. The Board discussed and approves the annual district goals at the October Board meeting. The highlights will include plans to improve student achievement in math and writing, as well as increase use of technology and electronic tools to improve achievement and engage students in the learning process. Additionally, we will look to increase support for our struggling learners in math and language arts. Finally, we look to promote character and good citizenship through our school learning environment.

No ship sets sail without charting a course. Likewise, the school district does not open its doors without a plan to complete the mission.

The goals are what guide our vision. Our mission is to *"ensure that each student is challenged to fully develop individual abilities, skills and character to succeed in life. We are committed to creating an environment that cultivates*

Advanced Placement (AP) Update

The total number of AP tests taken by district students increased to 1,618 in 2007-08, up from 1,416 in 2006-07. The district's percentage of students taking tests remains significantly higher than our like districts and the state. In 2007, 58.9% of Grosse Pointe seniors took the tests, compared to 14.5% for Michigan. The district percentage of tests passed remains a very healthy 78.8%, well above state and national averages.

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I Vote for Reading

Need a specific holiday gift idea for a third grade grandson or a fifth grade niece? The GPPSS library media specialists hope you will consider results of a district wide election as you make your selection. This idea began last spring when the seven specialists decided to use the concept "I vote for reading" to help students explore the electoral process.

"Kids are very specific about their reading preferences," said Libby Van de Putte, the library media specialist for Defer and Trombly. Building upon that knowledge, librarians had each classroom nominate favorite book candidates. Then librarians read them to younger students or encouraged older students to read them independently so they could make an informed decision.

A primary election was held early in the fall. Each student voted for their favorite book using a secret ballot. Then, the top ten books district wide for each grade were voted upon.

Lessons and ballots were adjusted as needed. For example, Kindergarten students voted by using a picture ballot, while older students' ballots resembled those used in actual elections. All discussed concepts such as having one vote, secret ballots, and the importance
