#### **Welcome to Trustees**

If you know me, you know I was never the rare student who complained about being off school for the summer. However, over the years, I have come to appreciate the quality education I received from the Grosse Pointe Public School System. And now, as an advocate for the schools, I have to say I like this time of year.

Students are enrolled in classes. The staff has returned to updated buildings. Calendars are being marked with PTO meetings and school concerts. The stands are filling for football games on cool fall evenings.

As I go about planning what I need to do as a school board member to be prepared for upcoming school year it occurs to me that there are plenty of opportunities for others in the community to get involved.

- Share your enthusiasm and good news about our schools with a new neighbor.
- Be a classroom or lunch room volunteer.
- Consider serving on a curriculum committee or one of the school's Green Teams.
- Attend a sporting event.

Though my son is now in college I still feel a connection -- a sense of responsibility to our community. Vital neighborhood schools are an essential asset for all residents. They are a primary link to a community's desirability and any support you can offer will pay dividends for us all in the future. This year Grosse Pointe North hosted the North-South football game (considered one of our nation's great rivalries) and proceeds of the Chamber of Commerce's Tailgate Party went to the Grosse Pointe Foundation for Public Education.

So for those of you answering survey questions, volunteering in the classrooms, giving back by attending events or donating to the Grosse Pointe Foundation for Public Education (GPFPE), I want to start the year off by saying thank you.

#### **Board elections in November**

On the ballot this fall was one open position for the Board of Education. Two candidates applied:

- Diane Karabetsos of Grosse Pointe Woods and
- Incumbent Brendan Walsh of Grosse Pointe Park.

This newsletter went to print before the results were released. However, I would like to thank the League of Women Voters for hosting the school board candidate forum at 7 p.m., Tuesday, October 19 in South High School's Wicking Library which was then broadcast on Comcast channel 20/902 until the election.

#### 2010-11 budget update

Through continued wise stewardship of the funds available, we have maintained our tradition of excellence. We continue to work with our staff and community to find better ways of offering the education you expect and our children deserve in our neighborhood schools.

Negotiations with some bargaining units continue, but contracts have been settled with the Grosse Pointe Education Association (teacher's union), the GPAEOP (office professionals), Non-Instructional Staff, Technology, Paraprofessionals, and Executive Administration. These fundamentally sound contracts and better than projected budget information from the State, as well as higher elementary student counts have made it possible for us to

hire additional teachers, and reinstate some office and facilities staffing.

Assistant Superintendent Christian Fenton shared at the September Board meeting that as taxes are going down again this year (by \$553,084) a truth in taxation hearing was not required. He walked through the various taxes (homestead, non-homestead, commercial, sinking fund and debt). Board treasurer Brendan Walsh then presented a PowerPoint on the tax levy as the latest installment in the Financial Transparency series (posted online). They will present the first budget amendment (GAAA #1) in November corresponding with changes already shown in the Budget Modeling Utility (BMU).

As you can ascertain, our budgeting process is cyclical. Public opinion is always welcome at the televised monthly board meetings or by emailing budget@gpschools.org.

Harassment through any means, including electronically transmitted methods, may be subject to District disciplinary procedures. Such behavior is considered harassment whether it takes place on or off school property.

## **Trombly students Skype their science lesson**

tudents in the technology-rich Classroom of Susan Howey recently SKYPEd with a classroom in Webster, NY to share the results of a science project. Principal Walt Fitzpatrick said each class worked in groups to package a Pringle chip so it would reach the other school whole via U.S. mail. The goal was to design a package that required less volume and density yet allowed the chip to be shipped without being damaged. Using their Smartboard and Skype, the classes watched each other open the packages and examine the chips.

"Our class designed 10 packages and their class designed eight packages," said Howey. "Of the 18 packages, 13 arrived 100% intact, four had only minor 'chips' and one was significantly damaged."

As each package was opened the children cheered the condition of each chip. Howey said using this technology greatly increased the kids enthusiasm for the project because they met the kids who would be opening their Pringles packages, in other words they knew their audience.

Howey added, "My students had fun learning about the engineering/design process, specifically materials versus the mass/volume of a design and applying this knowledge to their packages. I thoroughly enjoyed this project not only for the learning it inspired in my students but also for the collaboration it fostered as we began a new school year."

Specifically this project addresses these areas of the curriculum:

 Students measured using common tools and selected appropriate units of measure.



 Students solved applied problems about volumes of rectangular prisms using multiplication and division and the appropriate units.

Video-conferencing like this broadens the perceived boundaries of our classrooms; students truly can share their learning with anyone. Howey's class is now planning to send their New York friends some Better Made chips and some diamanté poems they wrote.

"The chips are our way of saying thanks for doing the challenge with us, and the poetry is being sent so that my students' writing will gain a larger peer audience," said Howey. She said they will work with their partner class throughout the year and guarantees that technology in various forms will continue to be part of that partnership.
