Introduction

Maire Elementary School enjoyed its seventy-first year of providing an excellent education to the Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Park communities. During the 2007-08 school year 326 students in grades K–5 attended our school. Maire had two sections of half day kindergarten, three each of first, second, third, and fifth grades, four sections of second grade, and one special education classroom for students with Autistic Spectrum Disorder. We had 14 classroom teachers, 14 professional support teachers (many of them part time), and 9 non-certified support staff.

School improvement efforts this year focused on ramping up our writing instruction. Teachers worked together as teams at school and as participants in district training initiatives to identify strategies to teach writing more effectively.

Other key efforts included the implementation of NWEA assessments which gave teachers and parents the ability to access up to date, useful information about their students' achievement and learning styles. FAST, a newly adopted curriculum and set of methods, has helped students needing additional support with reading foundations. Many teachers participated in piloting math and social studies materials and as members of district curriculum committees.

Strong Family-School partnerships make Maire a very special place. Parents volunteer in many ways to support and improve our school community. Volunteers assist in the classroom, staff our noon time clinic, help supervise students at lunch and recess and beautify the school grounds. Generous funds from the PTO were used to purchase Elmo document cameras for every classroom, a new video camera, update freefield sound systems, subsidize the fifth grade trip to Howell Nature Center, the fourth grade trip to Lansing, and cover the cost of classroom subscriptions. The fifth grade left behind a restored Nature Center as their gift to the school as parents and children worked together to plant perennials and annuals.

Students participated in a wide array of enrichment activities during lunch time or after school which are organized by parents and staff. They included: Chess Club, Knitting, Ceramics, Choir, Spanish and French classes, and Golf. Our fourth and fifth graders provided community service to the school through their participation

in the School Safety Patrol and Service Club.

Other highlights of the school year included the participation of fourth and fifth grade students in the National Geographic Bee, and our traditional school wide Field Day. Maire Elementary School opened in October, 1936

Core Curriculum

The Grosse Pointe Public School System's core curriculum is developed under the auspices of the Educational Programs Leadership Council (EPLC), a group of teachers, parents, students, and administrators who meet monthly.

The core curriculum is based upon state standards in all subjects and extends beyond those standards by incorporating exemplary national standards. Curriculum committees, comprised of teachers, parents, students and administrators develop plans for each curriculum area. In addition, the views of the broader community are sought through Public Forums. The reports of the curriculum committees, which are submitted first to the EPLC and then to the Board of Education, include recommendations regarding assessment, staff development, integration of technology, and differentiated instruction to accommodate academic diversity as well as the curriculum itself. The district also offers a wide array of advanced placement and challenging enrichment courses and a comprehensive special education program.

During 2007–08 the district implemented a new Mathematics curriculum and piloted a variety of math materials culminating in the selection of *Everyday Math* for grades 1-5 and Harcourt for Kindergarten. A new social studies curriculum was adopted for grades K-2 and 5 (grades 3 and 4 are still under study due to late changes in the state curriculum) and materials to support instruction were purchased.

During 2008-09 the science curriculum will be under review. Kindergarten and first grade teachers and reading specialists also received significant training and support materials to implement FAST reading strategies in 2008-09. Additional model units and technology applications are continually being integrated into curricular areas.

The district's strong curriculum is demonstrated by the continuing high performance of our students on standardized assessments including NWEA, MEAP, ACT, SAT, and Advanced Placement tests.
