## **Introduction**

Mason School is very special! We are a small, tightly woven school community whose traditions create an excellent foundation for learning. Strong family partnerships, an active PTO, wonderful parent volunteers, and a dedicated staff of professionals contribute to the success of Mason students. Working together, we ensure that our children benefit from the best possible educational experiences.

Students at all grades strive to meet and exceed curricular expectations. Grade level and school wide activities are designed to expand and enrich our students' learning. Kindergarten monthly themes and activity centers foster curiosity, and build academic and social skills. Kindergarten Café reinforces reading and math skills. Special persons is the theme of the Valentine concert. First graders focus on increasing literacy skills, with grade level reading activities and writers' workshop. Students tap their imagination with creative crafts at Arts and Scraps and celebrate cultural diversity at Golden Dragon Restaurant. The second grade study of insects culminates with the Bugs on Wheels assembly. Author sharing and mystery readers are exciting events. Snack sales generate economic lessons for second graders. Third graders increase their proficiency in word processing and recall of math facts. Readers' Theater enhances their presentation skills. The State Fair features research reports, displays, and regional food. Fourth and fifth graders begin to learn Spanish as part of their instructional day. Fourth graders tour the Capital and Michigan Historical Museum. Journal writing and pen pal correspondence expand their writing experiences. Fifth graders create technically proficient PowerPoint presentations as well as electrical models. Camp Storer is a memorable time of teambuilding for them. PLP students participate in Special Olympics, host a celebratory family dinner, create holiday gift baskets, run Mason Mart, and tally Box Tops for Education.

Students also do community outreach. Mrs. Briggs' class enjoys activities with senior citizens at Sunrise Assisted Living. Classes sponsor gift baskets for area charities. Student activities include: safety and service squad; band; orchestra; honors band; honors orchestra; special choir; model building; Jump Rope for Heart; March Read-ins; Book It; Field Day; and the Talent Show. ## Core Curriculum

The Grosse Pointe Public School System's core curriculum is developed under the auspices of the Educational Programs Leadership Council (EPLC), a group of teachers, parents, students, and administrators who meet monthly.

The core curriculum is based upon state standards in all subjects and extends beyond those standards by incorporating exemplary national standards. Curriculum committees, comprised of teachers, parents, students and administrators develop plans for each curriculum area. In addition, the views of the broader community are sought through Public Forums. The reports of the curriculum committees, which are submitted first to the EPLC and then to the Board of Education, include recommendations regarding assessment, staff development, integration of technology, and differentiated instruction to accommodate academic diversity as well as the curriculum itself. The district also offers a wide array of advanced placement and challenging enrichment courses and a comprehensive special education program.

During 2007-08 the district implemented a new Mathematics curriculum and piloted a variety of math materials culminating in the selection of *Everyday Math* for grades 1-5 and Harcourt for Kindergarten. A new social studies curriculum was adopted for grades K-2 and 5 (grades 3 and 4 are still under study due to late changes in the state curriculum) and materials to support instruction were purchased.

During 2008-09 the science curriculum will be under review. Kindergarten and first grade teachers and reading specialists also received significant training and support materials to implement FAST reading strategies in 2008-09. Additional model units and technology applications are continually being integrated into curricular areas.

The district's strong curriculum is demonstrated by the continuing high performance of our students on standardized assessments including NWEA, MEAP, ACT, SAT, and Advanced Placement tests.

## School Improvement Plan

The Mason School Improvement plan includes strategies and objectives that are aligned with the district and school mission. Staff development is an integral component of the ongoing school improvement process. These are our Goals:

- 1) All students will demonstrate increased proficiency in their reading comprehension skills. This will be measured by:
  - State MEAP Test
  - NWEA Measures of Academic Progress
  - Teacher designed classroom assessments
- 2) All students will demonstrate increased proficiency in their writing skills with a focus on expressive language and the use of supporting details. This will be measured by:
  - Grosse Pointe Writing Assessment
  - State MEAP Tests
  - Teacher designed classroom assessments
- 3) All students will demonstrate increased proficiency in their multiple step math problem solving skills. This will be measured by:
  - State MEAP Test
  - NWEA Measures of Academic Progress
  - Teacher designed classroom assessments
