Dear Defer Families,

Each year, schools and districts review policies and practices to consider ways to improve and enhance student achievement. Defer Elementary School continually strives to be a better school on a daily basis. School Improvement is not a topic for the administrator, or a binder on a shelf – it is the way we do business at Defer. So what are we doing right now in the area of School Improvement? I thought you'd never ask!!! I'd like to share a specific action we are taking for School Improvement each month in my newsletter.

## RTI

Response to Intervention (RtI) is a multi-tier approach to the early identification and support of students for their learning needs. The RTI process begins with high-quality instruction and universal screening of all children in the general education classroom. Students struggling on a topic are provided with interventions at increasing levels of intensity to accelerate their rate of learning. Throughout the RTI process, student progress is monitored frequently to examine student achievement and gauge the effectiveness of the intervention. RtI is not a special education intervention, but is a part of general education.



#### So what does Rtl look like at Defer?

Three times a week, for a minimum of 20 minutes in each session, students are grouped for RtI work in their grade. The focus of learning is based on the data from instruction in the classroom. Let me share two on-going examples of RtI during the month of November with you.

**In 2nd** grade after six weeks of reading instruction, data was used to group students for Rtl. During Rtl time four teachers come to-

gether and work specifically with smaller groups on the reading skill areas needed. Two of the teachers are the Reading Specialists and they pull those students needing very intensive reading interventions. During that same time the two second grade teachers then regroup the remaining students into a decoding group and a comprehension group, based on the classroom data. At the end of six weeks of RtI, we will access students on the specific skills taught during the RtI session to evaluate and plan for the next RtI session.

In 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade, their November Rtl sessions are focused on Math. After teaching the entire math unit, they used the data from the math chapter test to group students for reteaching. During this Rtl session, some students are in groups working on telling time because that is where they are struggling, while another group is doing enrichment work around factoring because the data reveals that they have mastered the basic understanding and would benefit from enrichment on the topic.



To put it simply, no longer does the student that did poorly on subtraction on the math test just move on to the next topic. They are given intensive interventions on that topic to help them master it.

So who is a part of our RtI teams? The answer is - everyone at Defer. For instance, Mrs. Raab and Mrs. Moses are a part of the 1st grade RtI team and it is scheduled in a way that they can work intensively with a small group or an individual student. For the month of November they are working on Fluency with 1st graders as a part of RtI. Kindergarten is including parents as a part of their team, and they are doing RtI at the end of the day when parents are available. Karen Labarge, Sheila Russo, and Stefan Harris, our Title 1 team, are a part of RtI teams at all grade levels. Clearly, we are in this together!

Will we make a difference, our assessments will tell us, and that information will keep driving where we go with each 6 week session of Rtl this year.

## POSITIVE BEHAVIOR SYSTEM (PBS)

A positive behavior support system is a data-based effort that is implemented by collaborative, school-based teams. School-wide expectations for behavior are clearly stated, widely promoted, and frequently referenced. Both individual and school-wide behavior problems are assessed comprehensively. Students are offered a continuum of methods that help them learn and maintain appropriate behavior and discourage violation of codes of student conduct.

Our PBS program is central to Defer. Our leadership team meets monthly to analyze school behavior data coming out of each individual classroom. Behavior trends are recognized, the focus for reteaching are established based on those trends, and students are identified that may need further help with behavior issues. Interventions are put in place for these students so that they achieve



Each month Defer students and staff come together to celebrate our success as a PBS school. Our monthly Reward Parties are a way to recognize our students for respecting themselves and each other with behaviors that create a safe learning environment for all students.

Last month 95% of our students earned the right to attend the Great Egg Drop Reward Party, and what a party we had!!! Students worked in collaborative teams to design a 'nest' for their raw egg that would survive a drop from an elevated height. Once nests were designed each grade reported to their designated location outside the 'drops' began. Teachers were assigned to ladders, tops of slides, and even the fire escape to launch the nests. Teachers were forced to climb higher and higher as an amazing number of eggs survived multiple drops.

Were their winners in each grade? Sure there were, but what really took place, was a school full of winners. Our students knew how to work cooperatively. Our students knew how to handle defeat when their egg broke, and they knew how to celebrate the successes of others. At the end of the day what we had was a school full of students who were already planning a better nest for next year. As the principal of Defer, I couldn't have been prouder of the Defer Dragons.

Outside of the gym we feature a bulletin board devoted to PBS. Check it out. You'll get a sense from the pictures of what it means to be a PBS school!.

## Reading: Why is Reading Outside of School so Important to Our Children?

With everyone's busy schedule why are teacher's requiring students to read every night at home. Does this time really make a difference in a child's education? The answer is a resounding yes, these minutes are precious. Let's do the math –

If they start reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6th grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 school days, and Student C will have read for 3.						

As a parent, you are your child's first - and most important - teacher. Here are some ways you can encourage reading and can help your child become a better reader.

- 1. **Read yourself**. Your actions really do speak louder than your words. When your kids see you reading the newspaper or curling up with a book, they will want to follow your example.
- 2. **Make sure your children read every day**. Reading like shooting baskets and playing the piano is a skill. Like other skills, it gets better with practice. Researchers have found that children who read every day whether they read books, newspapers, or magazines develop the skills to be better readers at school.
- 3. **Get the library habit**. Make sure everyone in your family has a library card. Schedule regular trips to the library and while you are there, check out a book yourself!

- 4. **Read aloud to the children**. In *The Read Aloud Handbook*, Jim Trelease reports on research showing that this is the most important thing parents can do to help their children become better readers. Here are some tips from the book:
- Start reading to your children when they are young. It is never too early to begin reading to your children, according to Trelease.
- Don't stop reading to your children as they grow older. You will both enjoy the chance to do something together.
- •Set aside some time each day for reading aloud. Even 10 minutes a day can have a big impact.
- Read books you enjoy. Your kids will know if you are faking it.
- 5. Give books as gifts. Then find a special place for your children to keep their own library.
- 6. **If you are not a good reader, you can still encourage your children**. As your children learn to read, ask them to read to you. Talk about the books your children have read. Ask a friend or relative to read aloud to your children.

### A FACELIFT FOR DEFER'S WEBPAGE

In an effort to make Defer's homepage as user friendly as possible for both students and parents the Defer staff is in process of making some changes. Leading this work is are the staff Technology and the Connections committees. This will be an on-going process this year, but two changes you can expect to see at this point include:



- A button on the homepage for each grade level as well as Specials and Support Services. When selecting one of the buttons, you will automatically be linked to resources at that grade level. No longer will you need to search the menu of teachers and follow those links to find out what resources are available at a particular grade or read the most recent newsletter.
- As a part of each grade level's resources, our teachers were videotaped teaching one of the ED Math algorithms relevant to that grade. So, as you are working on lattice method for multiplication you can link to a video of Mrs. Gout teaching her 4th grade students how it works.

We'll keep you posted as more changes and updates are incorporated. Our goal is for our website to be a useful tool. Let us know if you have any suggestions!

#### Dear Families:

The Grosse Pointe Public School System is beginning our identification of students for learning opportunities where they are most appropriately challenged. These learning opportunities include: differentiation in a general education classroom, cluster groups of students working collaboratively with identifiable and shared strengths in math and/or language arts, and our Magnet program focusing of the specific needs of academically gifted children.

Students in grades first through fourth may be nominated by parents and/or their teachers. All nominations will be reviewed by our Child Study Committee consisting of teachers and principals. This committee will review all nomination information as well as student testing data. As a committee we will make recommendations to parents and the nominated student's elementary school.

If your child's academic needs are being currently met, there is no need to nominate your child. If you would like your child considered for cluster grouping, or the Magnet program, please complete the nomination form. All nomination forms will be submitted directly to the Administration Building, 389 St. Clair, second floor c/o Patty Divirgil or Sue Vogel *on or before* Thursday, December 19<sup>th</sup> 2013.

The Child Study recommendations will be finalized by mid-May. After that time, families will be notified of your child's recommendation.

# Differentiation Instructional Philosophy

Differentiated instruction is the philosophy of the Grosse Pointe School District. This means children have the right to learn material at a rate, format, and depth that maximizes their learning. Differentiation is just one of many teaching practices used in our district. It can be subtle or very visible – that often depends on the needs of the individual learners and the goals for the group. All students experience some degree of differentiation in their classroom. It is not an accelerated program or a remediation of material – it is a constantly changing blend of the two based on the professionalism of the educator and the individual needs of the student.

The Grosse Pointe Public School District believes that providing differentiated learning opportunities to all students is a critical component of our educational system. It is a teaching strategy and one tool that all of our teaching professionals use daily with students to guarantee their personal and academic growth. It is challenging and informal; it is flexible and makes learning fun.

# How will I know when Differentiated Instruction is happening in my child's classroom?

Differentiation provides all students formal and informal opportunities to stretch and learn. This philosophy stresses teachers focus on individuals - we quide their individual learning and celebrate their individual success. focusing on student strengths, we bring forth their best. Differentiated learning opportunities may be clear when the child discusses how they worked in a small group on a different learning task while other students in the classroom worked on their different learning task. Differentiation learning opportunities may be less obvious through a teacher's questioning technique, or by having different expectations for a student's writing progress. Differentiation could also occur in math instruction through learning opportunities to explore a topic further or the need for additional support and practice. Our teachers make thoughtful and meaningful decisions for all of their students using differentiated instruction throughout their teaching day.

# Cluster Grouping in Math, Language Arts or Both

Cluster grouping is a formalized process for guaranteeing differentiation for our most capable learners. The Grosse Pointe Schools offer formal cluster grouping for grades 2-5 in Math and Language Arts. Cluster grouping will look different in each teacher's classroom. Typically a clustered student is ready to move at a more rapid pace once they have the base knowledge of the concept(s) being taught. Teachers may use different instructional strategies to meet the needs of these students within their homeroom. Clustering could be a small group of learners who already have mastered a concept accepting a more challenging problem to solve collectively, with a learning partner, or alone. Cluster grouping is not increasing the quantity of the work produced or changing the grade level of the curriculum being explored. It impacts the complexity of their grade level assignments and their curriculum. Cluster groupings yield deeper, richer experiences that challenge all students at their individual learning level.

### Is Cluster Grouping always formal?

No, Cluster Grouping can occur as the product of formal and informal identification. A student may be nominated by parents, teachers and/or the Child Study Committee and that process will be influenced by a combination of observation, work product and formal /informal assessment. Cluster groups may be based on ability, interest, learning styles, etc. Our teaching professionals are adept at identifying the individual needs of our learners and will cluster them appropriately so that each and every child shows growth.

**Response Actions Scheduled:** Operations and maintenance.


In addition, as required by Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (EPA), reinspections are conducted by accredited inspectors every three years since the implementation of our management plan.

One of the best kept secrets about Defer is our Lunchtime Enrichment program.


This is a program between December and February break where students get to chose to participate once a week from many offered indoor 'classes' during the cold winter weeks.


