When a student is signed out 50 minutes or less before the dismissal bell, they are marked "withdrawn early", over 50 minutes is an absence.





WINTER WEATHER GEAR

Winter is here to stay for awhile in Michigan. Be sure your children are bundled up in attire appropriate for the weather. Students in the GPPS do go outside for recess when the wind-chill temperature is above 0. Please be sure that your child leaves for school dressed properly for the weather. All students must have boots and snow pants to play on the wood chips or playfield once the snow is on the ground—otherwise they must stay on the blacktop only. Appropriate dress includes boots (preferably waterproof), snow pants, hats, gloves/mittens (preferably waterproof), scarves etc.

It has been extremely muddy this winter. Even though the temperatures may not be especially cold, boots and snow pants are recommended to protect your child's clothing from the mud.

Exercise and activity are great ways for kids to recharge their brains during the school day and at home. Also, as many students walk to school in the cold temperatures, it is important to be mindful of appropriate winter gear. When the wind-chill temperatures are below zero degrees Fahrenheit, students are allowed to enter the building at 8:15 when teachers are on duty. When driving your child to school on the really cold days, it is best to drop them off at 8:15. Students may then enter the building without standing in the cold.

Students plan ahead: Make sure homework is complete, pack the backpack the night before, set out winter gear, and eat a healthy breakfast before coming to school.


Dos and Don'ts for Building Deep Math Skills

Though Common Core math problems may look complex, math itself hasn't changed. One plus one is still two. What has shifted is the way schools teach math under many states' new college- and career-readiness standards. To prepare students for an increasingly technical world, many teachers are working to strengthen students' deep math knowledge—how, where, and why math ideas fit together. How can you support that work at home? Here are six dos and don'ts.

Do know how elementary math builds.

As your child progresses from kindergarten into later elementary grades, math concepts will build on one another. For instance, under the Common Core, second graders learn how to break rectangles into two, three, or four equal parts. Third graders learn how to place these fractions on a number line and compare fractions' size. This leads to fourth graders being able to add and subtract fractions and mixed numbers. Teachers call this vertical understanding—knowing how skills build across grade levels. Your child's teacher

can explain related learning goals for each grade.



Don't press your child to move too quickly. If pushed through challenging ideas too fast, students can develop gaps of understanding and they won't be prepared to tackle high school math. Have honest conversations with your child's teacher about whether your child is on target, or needs extra help or enrichment.

Don't take the reins. If your child is struggling, it can be tempting to show him or her how to finish a problem. As much as possible, try to coach your child through the assignment. Many teachers are moving away from showing students how to simply compute answers; instead, they place students in small groups to explore challenges. At home, allow your child to put on his or her critical thinking cap.

Do ask extra questions. In the classroom, your child's teacher may ask questions that assess students' reasoning. Mirror



this at home by asking, "How do you know?" and "Do you think that's always true?"

Do make math as fun as possible. Sure, boosting deep math knowledge may feel like serious business. But to build your child's math confidence—which wavers for many students as math gets tougher—celebrate successes. Praise your child for studying hard, arriving at an answer, or tackling a tricky problem for the first time. Play age- and skill-appropriate math games that bring math to life and boost family fun.

Office Reminders

It is best to make sure your child is prepared in the morning with their winter gear, lunch, homework or any other needed items. This reduces the many visits to the school by parents. This also minimalizes the amount of classroom interruptions during the school day. If you must bring in an item please be sure it is <u>labeled with your</u> child's name and their teacher.

Many parents have been calling and leaving messages to be given to their children on the school voicemail. The office is a very busy place and messages are checked first thing in the morning. We do not always get the messages left at the end of the day. Please make sure you talk with a secretary if a message needs to get to your child. Again, please try and have all of your after school plans arranged before your child comes to school.

Drop Off and Pick Up of Students

- 1. When dropping off or picking up students, please remember NOT to double park in front of the school. It's very dangerous.
- 2. McKinley Ave. is a NO PARKING ZONE. Please be considerate of others (neighbors across the street from our building), by using this area for drop off and pick up only. **Police will ticket anyone** parked in front of our school. Parents, you are encouraged to call the Farms police and report any repeat offenders.
- 3. Don't leave kids unattended in your cars. Never leave your automobile. If you must come into the building, park in the circle (PLEASE DON'T DOUBLE PARK) on McMillan or behind Rite Aid. Never park in the STAFF LOT(RICHARD STAFF STICKER REQUIRED) or handicap spot, as we have parents/teachers who need those spots in the parking lot.
- 4. Consider parking down the street and crossing Ridge Rd. with the crossing guard. This works well for many of our students and eliminates the Kercheval-McKinley "bottleneck."
- 5. **Never use Ridge Rd. as a drop off or pick up location. It's dangerous and** your car would be parked on the wrong side of the street.



Responsibility at Home

Please take a few minutes to discuss responsibility with your children. Ask them what was discussed in the classroom and see if they can give an example of someone who has demonstrated responsibility. Talk with your children about responsibility. Tell them that responsibility isn't just doing chores, it's following through on commitments, answering for their own actions, being reliable and trustworthy, using good judgment, taking care of their own affairs, and not procrastinating. Let them know that these are signs they are growing up and can be trusted with greater freedom.

Strategies for Teaching Responsibility

- 1. Give children responsibilities and make your expectations clear.
- Don't take it back from them. If they know that you will continue to remind them to do something, they may wait until you do it for lose your temper. Either way, you are holding onto the responsibility of seeing that it is done.
- 3. After making the directions very clear, provide an appropriate consequence after asking the first time.
- 4. Look for opportunities to reinforce character in daily situations. Play the "what would you do if" game. Talk about situations that they may encounter.
- 5. Make sure you and other members of the family are good role models.
- 6. Do not overwhelm them with too many tasks at one time; it is better to do a few things well.
- 7. Give them tasks that they can be successful at. Success and praise motivate a child to do their best.
- 8. Expect them to be successful. Allow them to complete the task without hovering over them.
- 9. Add new tasks as they become more capable. Let them know that everyone is expected to contribute in the family.
- 10. Make sure the tasks are age appropriate.

The GPPSS librarians are excited to announce that Overdrive is now available in all our schools. Many of you already use Overdrive through the GPPL for ebooks and audiobooks. Our students will now have access to a curated collection assembled by the school librarians.

All students have a 2 book checkout limit. These 2 books will not count against the regular checkout which your student has at the school library each week. While our students can view the entire collection (children through young adult), they will only be able to check out the books in the children's collection (this is based on their birthdate).

Ask your student to log in (using their school username and password) so you can learn more about this wonderful resource. Students can search by format (ebook or audio as well as read along) and by interest level. Students can also put titles on hold (these digital resources are single user) and even request titles which they would like the librarians to purchase.

Most studies suggest that print still beats out digital when it comes to curling up with a good book. That said, digital media--books, magazines, videos, music--are increasingly available and convenient, with a "coolness" factor that many young readers find irresistible! Grosse Pointe Public School families and library patrons have easy access to a growing array of digital media:

Students now have exclusive access to an **OverDrive** digital collection of ebooks and audiobooks curated especially for K-12 readers by GPPS library teachers!

- Download the OverDrive app to read on mobile devices, or just read in your browser.
- On your school's homepage, select "OverDrive Digital Collection" from the "Library" tab drop-down menu.
- Login with student username and password, just like logging in to school computers.
- Search for a specific title/author, or browse by Collection, Subject, or Reading/Interest Level.
- Filter for format (ebook or audiobook) or availability.
- Read a sample.
- Borrow up to 2 titles at a time, for up to 14 days.

The Grosse Pointe Public Library also subscribes to a variety of digital media collections. Students (and parents) can create accounts using their library card number. Start your digital adventure at the GPPL website (www.gp.lib.mi.us): Open the "eLibrary" tab and select "eBooks and other Digital Collections." Download the apps for mobile use, or stream media in your browser.



Hoopla offers lots of different digital media formats for all audiences--movies, tv, music, and comics as well as ebooks and audiobooks. *Account settings can be adjusted to show only kid-appropriate content.* To browse children's media, select the "Children's" category within any chosen format. Don't miss the "Picture Books on Video" collection!



RBDigital (formerly **Zinio**) offers current and back issues of popular magazines. The *Highlights* family of magazines has stories, articles, games, and puzzles for ages 0-12, including *High Five Bilingue* in Spanish. *Chirp* (3-6), *ChicakDEE* (6-9) and *Owl* (9-13) are less well-known but similarly appealing. Get the newest issue of *American Girl* or back-issues of *Zamoof!* No limits to how many you borrow or how long you keep them!

(The selection for adult readers is extensive, including *The Atlantic, Bon Appetit, Martha Stewart Living, National Geographic, The New Yorker, Newsweek, Oprah, Popular Science, Rolling Stone, Traditional Home, Yoga Journal...!*)
