Please be sure to put your child's name on their belongings.
ALL BELONGINGS. Bicycles, scooters, helmets, coats, hats, gloves, boots. Many children have the same jacket or scooter. It is very easy to mistake someone else's property as your own. We are hoping this will help in returning things to the rightful owner.

Drop Off and Pick Up of Students

- 1. When dropping off or picking up students, please remember NOT to double park in front of the school. It's very dangerous.
- 2. McKinley Ave. is a NO PARKING ZONE. Please be considerate of others (neighbors across the street from our building), by using this area for drop off and pick up only. **Police will ticket anyone** parked in front of our school. Parents, you are encouraged to call the Farms police and report any repeat offenders.
- 3. Don't leave kids unattended in your cars. Never leave your automobile. If you must come into the building, park in the circle (PLEASE DON'T DOUBLE PARK) on McMillan or behind Rite Aid. Never park in the STAFF LOT(RICHARD STAFF STICKER REQUIRED) or handicap spot, as we have parents/teachers who need those spots in the parking lot.
- 4. Consider parking down the street and crossing Ridge Rd. with the crossing guard. This works well for many of our students and eliminates the Kercheval-McKinley "bottleneck."
- 5. **Never use Ridge Rd. as a drop off or pick up location. It's dangerous and** your car would be parked on the wrong side of the street.

YES, WE ARE GOING OUTSIDE!

Parents, please note during the late fall, winter and early spring months students are expected to come prepared for outdoor recess <u>everyday</u>. This is extremely important as our weather can change dramatically from the morning to the afternoon and vice versa. Label all items!

Library

Kindergarten and 1st Graders have been learning how to distinguish storybooks from fact books and where to locate them in the library. They can also identify parts of a book. 2nd Graders have had important lessons in how to find the "Just right book" and share ways in which we can all be safe online. 2nd graders also learned about the GPPL network and how we can enjoy books from 17 different libraries! All students have been encouraged to expand their reading interests during book checkout. Library classes for 3rd, 4th and 5th will take place during session 2 (Nov 13-Jan 23) and session 4 (Mar 27-June 15).

Spanish

Third graders have learned to describe how their personality and how they are feeling. We are also covering our first story telling in Spanish by looking into monarchs' migration to Mexico. Fourth graders have covered numbers in various activities and completed their assessments on numbers 1-100. They too are completing their first story telling for the year. Their story telling will be on Peru's lost city of Machu Picchu. Can't wait for our adventure! Fifth graders covered multiple activities on sports and hobbies and cultural activities like *Fiesta del Pilar* and *Siestas*. We are going to move on into looking at Spain's communities and creating our own neighborhoods.



We receive frequent emails from one of our favorite resources: Love and Logic. As many parents know, we feel very confident in the strategies and skills that Love and Logic teaches parents and teachers. Here is a recent article that we feel is worth sharing:





Getting Kids to Think



Have you ever stopped to think about what a blessing it is to be a good thinker? Now I'm not necessarily talking about being a genius or intellectually gifted. I'm mostly referring to being able to use good problem-solving skills and good old-fashioned common sense.

As this world becomes ever more complex and temptation-laden, it becomes more and more important that we teach our kids how to build their mental muscles. Listed below are some guick tips:

- When your kids ask you for help with something, encourage them to try a bit longer before you
 jump in to help them. The only way to really learn good thinking skills is by having to figure out
 some things on your own.
- Ask them as many questions as possible. Examples include, "What else might you try? What have you seen other people do to solve this problem? What would happen if you tried_____?
 Where might you learn how to do that? Is that something you could learn about in a book, by asking someone, or by looking on the internet?"
- Allow them to mess up. Too frequently, we step in and tell kids exactly what to do when we worry
 that they might make a mistake. When the consequences are small, allow them to blow it and
 learn.

In our book, <u>Love and Logic Magic: When Kids Leave You Speechless</u>, we also teach the importance of limiting the amount of TV kids watch and how to deal with all of the arguing that can happen when we begin to set limits. The less TV your kids watch the better thinkers they will become.
