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TARDY OR ABSENT?

Monday—A student is marked tardy if they arrive after 9:10 but before 10:00 for AM instruction or after 12:26 but before 1:35 for PM instruction. A student is marked absent if they arrive after 10:00 in the AM, or after 1:35 in the PM.

Tuesday-Friday—A student is marked tardy if they arrive after 8:25 but before 9:15 for AM instruction or after 12:46 and before 1:15 for PM instruction. A student is marked absent if they arrive after 9:15 in the AM, or after 1:15 in the PM.

When a student is signed out 50 minutes or less before the dismissal bell, they are marked "withdrawn early", over 50 minutes is an absence.



March is Reading Month

Why Your Child Should Read for 20 minutes Every Day

LET'S FIGURE IT OUT --- MATHEMATICALLY!

Student A reads 20 minutes five nights of every week; Student B reads only 4 minutes a night...or not at all!

Step 1: Multiply minutes a night x 5 times each week. Student A reads 20 min. x 5 times a week = 100 mins./week Student B reads 4 minutes x 5 times a week = 20 minutes

Step 2: Multiply minutes a week x 4 weeks each month. Student A reads 400 minutes a month. Student B reads 80 minutes a month.

Step 3: Multiply minutes a month x 9 months/school year Student A reads 3600 min. in a school year. Student B reads 720 min. in a school year.


Student A practices reading the equivalent of ten whole school days a year. Student B gets the equivalent of only two school days of reading practice.

By the end of 6th grade if Student A and Student B maintain these same reading habits, Student A will have read the equivalent of 60 whole school days. Student B will have read the equivalent of only 12 school days.

One would expect the gap of information retained will have widened considerably and so, undoubtedly, will school performance. How do you think Student B will feel about him/herself as a student?

Some questions to ponder:

Which student would you expect to read better? Which student would you expect to know more? Which student would you expect to write better? Which student would you expect to have a better vocabulary? Which student would you expect to be more successful in school....and in life?





What is a Read-A-Thon?

The Read-A-Thon will be our largest fundraiser of the year. Participants will earn money by gathering pledges or flat donations, reading, and logging their minutes read. Participants will count every 10 minutes they read as 1 unit. Participants will get pledges from family, friends, neighbors, etc. to support their reading efforts. Donors can either pledge a certain amount of money per reading unit or a flat donation.

How do I get Pledges?

Ask friends, family, neighbors, colleagues, etc. Anyone who you think would be interested in helping support your child's reading initiatives. You will receive a pledge sheet and reading tracking sheet in your child's folder. Gather pledges prior to the start of the Read-a-Thon and then track your child's minutes daily.

When are Pledges/Donations due?

After the read-a-thon ends, collect all promised pledges and donations. All money, pledge sheets, and reading logs will be due back to the school by March 27, 2017.

What is our Goal?

Our #1 goal is to make sure the students have fun and enjoy reading. As a school we have a goal of every student reading 20 minutes a day or 2 reading units.

Pledging: We hope to collect \$10,000.00 in pledges. If every student collects \$25.00 in donations or pledges, we will hit our goal.

Will there be an Award for Top Performing Students?

Rules for Readers


WHEN: Starts on March 6th and ends March 17th

INDIVIDUAL GOAL: 200 minutes!!! 20 minutes per day, every day.

PARTICIPATION RULES:

Use your Pledge form to get sponsors and keep track of how much they will pledge or donate. Track your reading progress daily on your reading log and have your parents initial each night. When the Read-A-Thon is over, collect your pledges and donations and turn them into the School Office on Monday, March 27th. All checks are to be made payable to Richard Elementary PTO.

- 1. Reading before March 6th, does not count towards the Read-A-Thon.
- 2. Other people reading to you counts as well.
- 3. Reading aloud to other people counts. If you read to your friend, brother, sister, it counts. Reading aloud to your dog, cat, even your goldfish also counts!
- 4. Read anywhere. Reading anywhere outside of school counts. Reading in the car, in your home, at a friend's house, or under the covers with a flashlight. It all counts.... Just make sure to have your parents initial your total time each day.
- 5. Every 10 minutes of reading is counted as 1 unit. Pledges are per unit. If you read 30 minutes you have earned 3 units of reading.
- 6. Reading books, magazines, comic books, short stories, and websites all count. Any parent approved readable material can count towards your reading log.
- 7. Reading, instead of doing homework, does NOT count.
- 8. Reading, instead of watching TV, DOES count.
- 9. Reading at School does NOT count. This is for all reading outside of school.
- 10. Please be honest about your reading time, so that it is fair and fun for all students.
- 11. The last day to read for the Read-A-Thon is March 17th.
- 12. All money, pledge sheets and reading logs are due to the office by Monday, March 27th, 2017. Please make sure that all checks are made out to Richard Elementary PTO.
- 13. The Top 4 Readers in the school will be eligible for the Grand Prizes of an Amazon Fire Tablet with an Amazon Gift Card. Top 4 readers will be determined by the highest number of minutes logged.



Parents, please remember students must be fever/symptom free for 24 hours (without the aid of medication) before returning to school.

Office Reminders

It is best to make sure your child is prepared in the morning with their winter gear, lunch, homework or any other needed items. This reduces the many visits to the school by parents. This also minimalizes the amount of classroom interruptions during the school day. If you must bring in an item please be sure it is labeled with your child's name and their teacher.



Many parents have been calling and leaving messages to be given to their children on the school voicemail. The office is a very busy place and messages are checked first thing in the morning. We do not always get the messages left at the end of the day. Please make sure you talk with a secretary if a message needs to get to your child. Again, please try and have all of your after school plans arranged before your child comes to school.

Drop Off and Pick Up of Students

- 1. When dropping off or picking up students, please remember NOT to double park in front of the school. It's very dangerous.
- 2. McKinley Ave. is a NO PARKING ZONE. Please be considerate of others (neighbors across the street from our building), by using this area for drop off and pick up only. **Police will ticket anyone** parked in front of our school. Parents, you are encouraged to call the Farms police and report any repeat offenders.
- 3. Don't leave kids unattended in your cars. Never leave your automobile. If you must come into the building, park in the circle (PLEASE DON'T DOUBLE PARK) on McMillan or behind Rite Aid. Never park in the STAFF LOT(RICHARD STAFF STICKER REQUIRED) or handicap spot, as we have parents/teachers who need those spots in the parking lot.
- 4. Consider parking down the street and crossing Ridge Rd. with the crossing guard. This works well for many of our students and eliminates the Kercheval-McKinley "bottleneck."
- 5. Never use Ridge Rd. as a drop off or pick up location. It's dangerous and your car would be parked on the wrong side of the street.
