HELPING CHILDREN Understand Autism

S ince one in every 68 children is diagnosed with autism, your child is likely to encounter a number of children with the disorder. How you respond to your child's questions significantly impacts your child's understanding of this complex disorder, as well as his or her acceptance of individuals with different abilities. Here are some suggestions to help your child understand autism.

Be honest. If you don't know a lot about autism, tell your child that you don't know but are willing to find out. Take advantage of your child's curiosity and seek resources to help. Many children's books explain autism in a way that young children can understand. Websites contain helpful information for children, parents, and providers.

Talk to the child's parent. Ask the parent for suggestions about how to help your child to interact in a way that

Know that every child is

different. Autism is a spectrum disorder, so no two children with autism are alike. A child with autism might have areas of exceptional talent, as well as areas of deficit. Help your child understand that autism presents itself in variable ways.

Put a positive spin on it.

Be careful not to describe individuals with autism as lacking in some important way. Focus on the positive and describe what your child can

do to help. For example, say, "Tony is an excellent artist. You can talk about his drawings with him by asking him specific questions."

When relaying an area of challenge for the child with autism, help your child relate to the experience. You might say, for example: "Remember how it was hard to hear me



will engage the other child. You can also learn about the child's interests and then share suggestions with your child about conversation starters.

Parents of children with autism seek good peer role models for their children in order to improve their language and social skills. Finding willing peers to interact with their children is challenging, so this could be a good opportunity for your child to be a good influence.

Encourage interaction. If the child acts out or must leave a play date early, reassure your child that this does not mean that he or she did anything wrong. Schedule future play dates so that your child can see the positive effects of his or her interactions over time.

- ٠ Please use the buzzer system at each door to enter building.
- All visitors must check in at the school office. This includes parent volunteers and other service per-٠ sonnel.
- If you have forgotten items to bring to your child, such as lunches, homework, musical instruments, ٠ etc., please deliver them to the office. We want to keep classroom interruptions to a minimum. All messages will be delivered at 11:40 or 3:20 on Monday and 11:20 or 3:20 Tuesday through Friday.
- If your child needs to be dismissed early, please alert the teacher via a note or email as to the time to ensure your child has all necessary homework/materials ready at their dismissal. When you arrive in the office to sign your child out, the secretary will then call to have your child dismissed. Parent Involvemen

Podcasts can be a terrific way for adults and kids learn while listening. Many podcasts are free, downloadable and portable. Episodes will can be serialized or stand alone. Subscribe to favorites and the latest episodes will populate your mobile podcast app on a weekly or bi-weekly basis. Check out <u>Common Sense Media</u> for a list of 20 podcasts for kids, preschool through teenagers. The following are selected for elementary students...



The Story Pirates aren't your typical swashbuckling sailors. We're searching for a different kind of treasure: kids' wildest, most imaginative stories. Each week, the crew aboard the Story Pirates' ship—including world-class actors, comedians, improvisers and musicians—takes original stories from real kids around the country, and turn them into a wildly funny comedy podcast for kids, ages 3 - 103.



Each story is usually 10 to 15 minutes long, hopefully just long enough to keep your toddler, preschoolers, and little ones engaged. Story Time is a free audiobook podcast for preschoolers and little kids.



The Alien Adventures of Finn Caspian is a serialized science-fiction story for kids, told in 15-20 minute episodes. The story centers on Finn Caspian, an 8-year-old boy aboard a space station. He and his friends Abigail, Elias and Vale explore uncharted planets, help the occasional alien, and solve a mystery that threatens to destroy their home. It's targeted for ages 5-10, contains no violence and a little bit of suspense.



This podcast takes kid-submitted science questions and answers them with the help of experts. What makes this one different is it tends to skew a bit older, both in its questions and answers, and it has a different kid co-host each week. The result is a fun show that's as silly as it is educational. This is intended for kids and tweens



History is amazing and these stories have the power to transform people today. The goal is to share true stories in an easily accessible and diverse manner. Through bite-sized audio-based stories, music, a website, and illustrated children's books, we aim to spark the curiosity of children, parents, teachers, and **anyone else** who loves a great story and the past.
